Hyperbole (; Ancient Greek: *ὑπερβολή*, *hyperbolē*, from *ὑπέρ* (*hup é r*, 'above') and *βάλλω* (*b á ll*, 'I throw')) is the use of exaggeration as a rhetorical device or figure of speech. In rhetoric, it is also sometimes known as *auxesis* (literally 'growth').

~~Understatement vs. Hyperbole—What's the difference ...~~

Hyperbole is the opposite of an understatement. The word 'hyperbole' comes from a Greek word meaning 'over-casting' or 'excess'. Why is Hyperbole Used? Hyperbole has a humorous effect created by an exaggerated overstatement. It is used to make something sound more dramatic than it actually is. For example:

Contrast with hyperbole. Jeanne Fahnestock points out that understatement (particularly in the form known as *litotes*) "is often used for self-deprecation on the rhetor's part, as when the heavily decorated war hero says 'I have a few medals,' or someone who has just won on American Idol observes 'I did OK'" (Rhetorical Style, 2011).

This book attempts to analyse irony, paradox, oxymoron, overstatement, understatement, euphemism, and dysphemism from the point of view of both Cognitive Linguistics and Pragmatics. In order to do so, we have regarded each trope as a cognitive model, and observed that the various ICMs that resulted from this approach had in common an essential feature: they were all constructed around the creation of contrasts. Also, we have developed a common processing model for these ICMs, which shows that these so-called figures of speech can be fully considered conceptual mechanisms of meaning creation and derivation.
